- Avoid traffic chokes; set up a transportation construction coordinator
- Cost and availability of Community Centres
- Refugees – Ottawa initiative
- Social Housing
- Complete Streets
- Crime Statistics at the local, community level
- Website, social communication
- Tree canopy protection; mitigation of impact and of blown asbestos
- Future of Natural Spaces and Greenbelt

**Now, it's your turn! Here are some of the questions we heard communities raising at the various meetings. Where do you stand on these issues? What would you like to say in a report to the City and the Public, on the state of Ottawa Communities and Citizen Groups?**

- What's the appropriate way to manage change – CDP, community vision or zoning revision?
