Agenda item 4 – Ottawa Police Service

The Ottawa Police Service 2016-2018 Business Plan is entitled ***Innovation and Investment in Community Safety***. This three-year plan was developed through active participation and ongoing input received from residents, community partners and members of the Ottawa Police Service. The plan:

- Responds to community concerns;
- Ensures that Members' top issues are addressed;
- Will help us achieve our vision of being a trusted partner in community safety; and,
- Will assist us in delivering effective policing services to the citizens of Ottawa.

The 2016-2018 Business Plan will assist us in continuing to deliver effective policing services to the citizens of Ottawa. We are grateful for the participation from the community and look forward to continuing this positive dialogue as we move forward. Shifts in demographics, types of crime, the fiscal environment, our geographic mix and a wide variety of international pressures all combine to create complex challenges for policing. As the Nation's Capital, Ottawa faces additional challenges and our policing service must be positioned to respond. This plan shapes and positions our organization to respond to these pressures.

There are four overarching themes-- innovation, partnerships, risk management and continuous improvement-- that will help foster a safe community for everyone.

In 2016, the overall crime rate in Ottawa increased +5.9% to 3,420 offences per 100,000 residents. The OPS also continues to clear approximately 36% of all Criminal Code of Canada offences (excluding traffic).

The Crime Severity Index (CSI) provides residents with another measure to help understand whether crime was more or less serious than in previous years. The CSI accounts for both the volume of crime and the relative seriousness of the incidents. In 2015, the CSI for Ottawa increased by 10.5% to 48.6.

Agenda item 9 – Committees – Transportation

The committee has considered traffic calming in the context of the City's review of its Area Traffic Management Program

Proposed motion:

That the FCA recommend to the City's Area Traffic Management Program review that the funds for traffic calming studies and projects be re-distributed on a ward basis and placed under the management of the ward Councillor on an annual basis, subject to the following criteria:

- a. That a community association or 10 residents on a street can initiate a request to access these funds;**
- b. That the Councillor keep a transparent list of traffic calming fund requests and disposition of these funds, available to the public online;**
- c. That there be a process of public consultation of the proposed traffic calming measures in the community or for the street(s) involved, prior to the disposition of these funds.**

Agenda item 11 – Lincoln Fields Development

Proposed motion:

Whereas the arrival of LRT to the Lincoln Fields Station coupled with the proposed re-development of Lincoln Fields Shopping Centre and under-development of other lands in the area, provides the opportunity for enlightened urban planning for the area, consistent with the City's Transit-Oriented Development Guidelines;

Whereas, in light of the above, six area-community associations (Whitehaven CA, Woodpark CA, Lincoln Heights-Parkway CA, Britannia Village CA, Belltown Neighbours Assoc., and Queensway Terrace North CA) are requesting the City of Ottawa to conduct a community-based visioning exercise for this area;

Therefore the **FCA endorses the request by the six area community associations for a community-based visioning exercise for this area prior to proceeding with specific development proposals and will support this endorsement with a supporting letter to council.**
