	You can form inpromptu coalitions to share issues and presentation points. There was a discussion on what the basic principles are (A. Cullen suggested it is not up to the FCA to impose a view on our member CA's), with tree canopy, intensification, affordability, transportation, social infrastructure (rec centres, libraries, etc.), "using a neighbourhood lens", etc. all mentioned as possibilities. The subject of "enough intensification" came up and A. Cullen proposed mitigation be sought where a lot of intensification has occured. The discussion progressed to the topics of; the need for definitions of words like "affordable", "low income", even "a tree" (there was arguably a consensus on the need for definitions) / transitional heights from hi-rises to single family dwellings next door / developers are constantly getting exceptions to Secondary Plans. C. Greenshields mentioned a general lack of respect of Secondary Plans when developments are proposed. He also raised the new rules around emergency shelters, which may see them dispersed across the City over time. P. Johanis urged two interventions now: 1. Have a Councillor bring forward a specific change needed, and 2. Delegations should seek broader support when bringing forward changes at the Planning Committee. A. Cullen suggested as many as possible show up to the meeting, and even if repeating the same points made by others will show support. L.
